FROM THE ARCHIVES

In October we had the pleasure of welcoming Dr Grace Chapman, Heritage Advisor at Reckitt, to our Coffee and Chat morning for an insightful and interesting talk about the history of Reckitt and its wide-reaching impact in Gipsyville.

Grace brought along a collection of archival objects for us to handle and books to flick through, revealing an often-overlooked side of Gipsyville's social history. Amongst the archive were journals from the 1920s – the aptly named Gipsyville Journal – written and produced by Hargreaves Brothers and Co as part of their philanthropic activity in the area in the early 20th Century. Each journal is pocket sized and richly illustrated with hand-drawn advertisements for Glosso, Gipsy Black Lead and Aladdin Metal Polish, and were once handed out to the workers employed at Hargreaves Brothers and Co factories.

"We're holding a bit of history," said Jean, a longtime Coffee and Chat member.

"Anything you can think of is in the archive," Grace told us, including pocket watches, chequebooks signed by Reckitt's past directors, and even gas masks from the Second World War!

Alongside the journals and bits of Brasso and Gipsy Black Lead, Grace showed us three old cans of Harpic. Harpic, one of the most recognisable products sold by Reckitt, was once used by over 50% of UK households. It's so famous in fact, that you've probably got a bottle of it hiding under your sink as you read this! We were lucky to get our hands on a rust-coloured Harpic bottle from the 1930s, almost unrecognisable compared to the plastic swan-neck bleach bottles we use now.









Reaching the end of Grace's visit, we spoke of Reckitt Radio, the lunchtime radio station that played to Reckitt workers during their shifts. "What's that song - 'Reckitt girls, Reckitt girls..." Nora started singing, taking us all back in time to the busy and energetic floors of the Essex Street factory.

Cawoods, Essex St, Gipsyville, 1981

Cawoods fish curing works are the most distinctive part of the Gipsyville estate, with their set of ceramic chimneys rising above the Shires. It was at this location that they produced dried salted fish in Hull for around a hundred years. Their Grimsby factory came later, and they moved all production there in 2002, a few years before the Hull Fish Market closed.
